<p><u>SOC219H5F: Gender, Crime and Justice</u> This course explores how gender impacts crime and criminalization and how gender shapes the way criminal justice is conceptualized and delivered. <p><u>SOC275H5F: Sociology of Gender</u> This course introduces students to the sociology of gender showing how gender is a relationship of power that structures our everyday lives from intimate relationships through global political and economic forces. Attention is given to the theoretical analyses of policing, the history of policing and to its public and private forms.
