Evaluation:

There will be two in-class tests and a short written assignment. These tests will consist of short written answers to questions on the instructor's lectures and key ideas of each chapter. Test 1 will cover lecture material and chapters 13-18. Test 2 will cover lecture material and chapters 19-27 and may contain questions or material from the first half of the course. More specific information about the material covered in each test will be provided later in the term.

The short written assignment will consist of a two-page paper responding to one of two possible questions that relate to course material. These questions, as well as more information on the expectations of the papers, will be provided later in the term. The paper will require no research outside course material.

Introduction to the paired concepts of inequality/solidarity and authority/illegitimacy in the works of key classical theorists such as Marx, Weber, Durkheim, Tocqueville and Simmel.

<u>IMPORTANT</u>: The prerequisite to take this course is SOC101Y1 or both SOC102H1 + SOC103H1. Students without this prerequisite will be removed at any time discovered, and without notice.

Required Text: Irving M. Zeitlin, Ideology and the Development of Sociological Theory,7th Edition, Pearson/Prentice Hall

Recommended Text: Irving M. Zeitlin, Rulers and Ruled, U of T Press. Chapters 13-27, from the Marxian Watershed to the great American Pragmatists.

Evaluation: There will be four in-class tests in the third, sixth, ninth and twelfth meeting, each worth 25%. The tests will consist of definitions and short answers to questions on the instructor's lectures and on the key ideas of each chapter. There will be no essays or final exam.

Attendance: responsibility for being aware of what the professor says in lectures (including administrative announcements) rests with students. As a precaution in case they miss a lecture, students should have a "buddy" who is willing to share their lecture notes.

Make-up tests: students who miss a test will receive a mark of zero for that test unless reasons beyond their control prevent them from taking it.
