Overview

This course will examine gun violence from different sociological perspectives. From drive-by shootings and stickup robberies to rampage shootings in schools, we will think sociologically about the causes and consequences of gun violence in various contexts. In addition to stimulating your sociological imagination, I hope that you will leave this course with a more critical understanding of gun violence in contemporary society.

Assignments

You will have 4 major grades for this course, which add up to 100% of your final grade (the research paper will be discussed in class):

- 1) An in-class midterm (30%)
- 2) A short research paper (30%)
- 3) An in-class final (30%)
- 4) 2 in-class pop quizzes (10%)

The pop quizzes will be short and in-class assignments. During these assignments, I will play you a video clip or music. You will then write a short response piece on how the multimedia might connect with one of the themes that we have covered in class. These assignments are not meant to test whether or not you know the "right" or "wrong" answers. Instead, these are designed for you to make some connections between readings, lectures, and in-class discussions. Make-ups for these impromptu assignments will **NOT** be accepted. I will only make exceptions for students who provide me with email and medical documentation of an emergency **24 hours** *before* the class in which I announce these assignments.

Plagiarism: Avoid plagiarism. It is a serious academic offense with serious penalties (see the "Code of Behavior on Academic Matters"). If you are using somebody else's ideas, do not present them as your own, whether you are quoting exact words, paraphrasing or summarizing.
